



Town's goal is to continue to meet the needs and expectations of our residents while keeping expenditures as low as possible. The final budget went to a Public Hearing on April 14, 2022, at 7:30 pm and will be voted on by residents at the Annual Town Budget Meeting on May 9, 2022, at 7:30 pm. The Region 4 Budget Referendum for Essex residents will be on May 3rd from 12:00 - 8:00 pm at the Essex Town Hall.

Lastly, I'd like to welcome our new Animal Control Officers, Harry Plaut and Matthew Carroll, who oversee animal control for Essex as well as Chester and Deep River, and Karen Abercrombie, our new Assistant to the Assessor.

Real Estate Tax Relief for Persons Totally Disabled or Over Age 65

The Assessor's Office is accepting applications for the State of Connecticut Circuit Breaker program until May 15th. To qualify for this program a person must be totally disabled or have reached age 65 by December 31, 2021. In the case of a married couple, only one spouse needs to be 65. The total household income, including Social Security benefits, must be less than \$46,400 for a married couple; and less than \$38,100 for a single person.

The property that you are seeking assistance for must be your primary residence. Once qualified for the State Circuit Breaker Program, a person/couple is also eligible for the Town of Essex matching benefit.

The amount of tax relief is a sliding scale based on total income. For example, if a married couple had a total income of \$20,000 for calendar year 2021, they may qualify for assistance from the State of up to \$1,000. The \$1,000 would be taken off their tax bill and the Town would match that benefit up to 100%, depending on age and years of residence in the current home. In this example, the tax bill could be reduced by as much as \$2,000.

If you, or someone you know, might be eligible for this benefit, please have them come to the Assessor's Office at Town Hall with their 2021 SSA 1099, and proof of any income earned in calendar year 2021 or a copy of the 2021 tax return prior to May 15, 2022.

I had the pleasure and honor to meet her (over the phone) as part of putting together our The Last Word feature article that appeared in Events Magazines for the 4th quarter of 2020. It is a conversation I will remember forever. Her ever so clear memory of the many great moments in her athletic career was astonishing – from Raybestos Brakettes softball games, to striking out Ted Williams and Hank Aaron, to golf moments, to how her coaching career came about. (She would tell you that she has been coaching all her life.) And of course, her father – whom she loved tremendously. Up until he passed, she would keep a room for him in her house in Florida and he would attend all the Florida Atlantic University softball games.

It is hard to believe that there was not more fanfare about this superb athlete who excelled in so many sports. That is until you spoke with her and found out how matter-of-fact she took everything. She could have been boastful or arrogant. But she was not. Instead, you could tell how much joy she found in all that she did. I had fun sharing stories about growing up in West Haven and the various individuals I had no idea we knew mutually.

And, of course, there was the ever-competitive spirit that came through not only in talking about her Florida Atlantic softball team but also about her own goals – even at the age of 80. As I recall, she recounted the story of helping a friend move. She stumbled while carrying a box. Her volleyball training helped break the fall. She did injure her hip. During the course of the conversation, it suddenly occurred to her. "Maybe I could golf left-handed," she said. If anyone can do it, I'd bet on you, I observed.

Sustainable Essex Hosting 1st Earth Day


Sustainable Essex is hosting its first Earth Day Celebration on Saturday, April 30th from 9:00 am - 1:00 pm at the Bushy Hill Nature Center in Ivoryton. This is an opportunity for community members from the tri-town area to gather and work together to create a better, more sustainable future for our planet. We have events to encourage us to repair, reduce, recycle and connect to nature.

First, we have many skilled volunteers that will be at our onsite "Repair Café" to help fix your small household appliances, computer, tablets, lawn equipment, bikes, and mend and alter clothing. This service is free of charge.

Second, we will focus on reducing food waste by composting. According to a recent survey that we did with Essex residents, 60% said they were interested in learning more about residential food scrap pick up. To help us explore this topic, the hauling company Blue Earth, will educate us on the importance of composting.

We also will have a few collections happening at the event to recycle hard-to-recycle items. We will be collecting "thin film" plastic that is clean, dry and free of food residue. To see the full list of acceptable items visit the NexTrex website. We are also collecting old tennis balls to be recycled, and we are collecting art and craft supplies to be swapped at a later date. There will also be education to help clarify "What's in and What's out" when it comes to proper contamination-free recycling.

Finally, we will be reconnecting with nature by visiting the farm animals, exploring the hiking trails and planting seedlings for the kids to take and plant in their garden. Specialist Shares Anxiety Reducing Strategies for Children



Funded by the Essex Elementary School Foundation, Tri-Town area parents were invited in mid-March to a live, two hour Zoom Talk, "Practical Strategies to Reduce Anxiety in our Children", presented by Jessica Mina-

han, author of *The Behavior Code: A Practical Guide to Under*standing and *Teaching the Most Challenging Students*. The Zoom talk was followed by a full day of professional development programming via Zoom for invited staff from the Chester, Deep River, and Essex elementary schools.

The professional development session was the final activity of a yearlong "Behavior Code" book study in which teachers at Essex Elementary School (EES) have been engaged. Over the course of this past school year, the EES teachers were given monthly reading assignments and then would gather as a group to discuss the various topics. Activities and games such as Jeopardy were included to help make the sessions fun, entertaining and light.

"We are delighted to have the generous funding and support from the Essex Elementary School Foundation which allowed us to bring a world-renowned author and speaker to our Region 4 community," says Jennifer Tousignant, Principal at EES. "During the COVID-19 pandemic, we have realized the increased need for social, emotional learning and growth. The pandemic has had quite the impact on our children and parents alike. Opportunities and experiences such as book study and professional development techniques taught by the author have helped provide our staff with skills needed to do their jobs every day as we continue to navigate the effects of the pandemic."

Throughout both sessions, parents, teachers, and staff were offered practical and easy-to-implement strategies to help minimize behavioral challenges. Using case studies, stories, and examples of everyday situations, participants learned preventive tools, tactics, and interventions for reducing anxiety, increasing self-regulation, accurate thinking, and self-monitoring in children.

The Essex Foundation Announces \$3000 Environmental Scholarship Deadline

AREA RESIDENTS ENCOURAGED TO APPLY BY MAY 10

The late Elizabeth (Diz) Barnes Callender and her sister Mary Frances Barnes were Essex residents deeply committed to land conservation and preservation. Upon a bequest, The Essex Foundation established the Elizabeth Barnes Callender and Mary Francis Barnes Annual Scholarship in their memory. A \$3000 scholarship will be awarded to one Valley Regional High School graduating senior or graduate, or an Essex resident who is pursuing studies related to land

conservation and preservation at a two or four-year college, a technical school, or graduate school, or taking accredited courses. Fields of study may include biology, botany, agronomy, ecology, horticulture, floriculture, forestry, landscape design, or environmental science.

To be considered for this year's award, applicants must submit materials to The Essex Foundation no later than May 10. Scholarship information and application forms can be found online at: theessexfoundation.org.

Essex Meadows Hosts Haitian Art Show

"In the bleak midwinter" of Essex, CT, where each day brings unpredictable mostly cold wintery weather and bare trees, people who visited the Essex Meadows Gallery from mid-February to mid-March were greeted with a variety of Haitian art. The bright colors, warm tropical scenes, telling stories

or with stories brought joy and warmth to those who visited the show whether intentionally or by chance.

Two organizations in this area, Sister Cities Essex Haiti (SCEH) in Essex and The Crosby Fund for Haitian Education in Old Lyme are the main links to the town of rural Deschapelles.

At different times the founders had visited Hospital Albert Schweitzer, founded in 1956 to participate in work teams. That was the impetus to create these two organizations to provide additional opportunities for Deschapelles. The









Haitians depict rural scenes that often tell stories. They also show the love and respect of nature in their art.

Crosby Fund focuses on scholarships for needy youth and SCEH's main effort has been to respond to the community's request for a large and active Library.

Haitians are innovative and wonderful artists. This show depicted art from metal cutouts, large and small, black and brightly painted. There are painted

papier maiché pieces from small imaginatively decorated andolides (lizards) to two full size realistically painted Rooster and a Hen. Small and large depictions of rural scenes often tell stories such as Crossing the Artibonite River in a barge or the Orchard of HAS. They depict love and respect of nature, many with birds and animals.

Both the Crosby Fund and SCEH purchase art to resell here to support the Deschapelles artists as well share the joy of Haitian art. People stopped to tell the organizers how much pleasure they got from seeing this show. Our response was: "We were happy that the Haitian artists brought joy to you during those bleak days."


Registration is underway for 2022 summer music theatre programs, which provide great

The Great Flood of 1982: "It looks like the end of the world..." – A Record-shattering Rain...

"The heaviest spring rain to impact Southern New England [in 1982] occurred the weekend of June 4-7. A large low-pressure system moved up from the Gulf Coast and moved slowly to the northeast, stalling (on) June 5 positioned to dump large amounts of water over Connecticut, and the rest of southern New England."

That's the National Weather Service's somewhat laconic, though accurate, description of a rain-storm system which resulted in the worst non-hurricane disaster to hit our region in living memory – the now-legendary Great Flood of 1982.

The system produced a deluge of Biblical proportions; up to 16 inches of rain – more than a quarter of an average year's total - fell in the state over the 4-day period, with the heaviest amounts occurring in south central Connecticut.

Those who lived through it will never forget it; dams burst in the towns of Clinton, Deep River, Essex, and Old Lyme, sending torrents of water rushing along the swollen streams and rivers. Thirteen state bridges were washed away or damaged beyond use, leaving more than 70 sections of state roads and highways un-us-

able. Local, town-maintained roads and bridges suffered as well.

At height of this epic tempest, more than a thousand people had been forced from their homes.

Up to a dozen persons were reported dead or missing, at the time. In Clinton, a woman died of a heart attack while bailing out her basement and a couple were swept off a stream crossing; a high school teacher drowned in Lyme when a bridge over Roaring Brook collapsed.

There were stories of bravery and sheer luck, too; a volunteer fireman, carried through a drainage pipe by the rushing waters of Latimer Brook in East Lyme, emerged safely on the other side. An Ivoryton man was rescued by boat from a perilous perch in a tree, surrounded by the rushing waters of the Falls River.

In the immediate aftermath, Gov. William A. O'Neill made a 10-hour tour of the state, which included a helicopter inspection of southeastern Connecticut. After viewing the widespread damage, he declared a state-of-emergency, ordering out National Guardsman to assist state and local law authorities with rescue efforts. (Local Guardsmen were later credited with the rescue of an imperiled Girl Scout troop in East Lyme.)

Meanwhile, the state's Civil Preparedness Center was set up at an armory near the state capitol in order to continue assessing the damage, state-wide. Power lines were down, water mains ruptured. Road closings were a major problem; Route 9, the Route 82 Connector, portions of state routes 148, 80 and 81 and many local roads showed areas of severe damage. While I-95 remained largely unscathed, washouts had occurred on the Amtrak and Conrail tracks, closing those vital rail lines.

The state rushed to prepare 20 mobile emergency homes to be used continued on page 40

as temporary housing, homes which had been used after an October tornado in the Windsor area which had left three dead, just three years before. Mobile water tanks were filled and made ready for delivery to stricken areas. As a result of all this, the governor planned to ask Pres. Ronald Ragan to declare Connecticut a disaster area, in order to aid economic recovery.

In all of the state, the town hardest hit by this record-shattering tempest was Essex, and the hardest hit area in Essex was Ivoryton. By the night of Saturday, June 5, official records showed 14 inches of rain had poured down in just 72 hours, more than three months' worth. Worse still, 10 inches had come pouring down on that fateful Saturday, alone.

The Great Flood's waters were unleashed around 12:30 am on Sunday morning, June 6, following that record Saturday rain; the 110-year-old dam burst at the Bushy Hill reservoir, up-stream from the town center, sending hundreds of millions of gallons of water cascading down a narrow valley stream-bed and into Clark's Pond, overlooking the west end of Main Street; the century-old dam forming the pond, known as a popular swimming spot, was no match for the waters now cascading down the canyon-like valley; it exploded, sending a 6-foot wall of water, travelling at an estimated 50 mph, barreling across Main Street; it slammed into the residential neighborhood along Cheney Street, knocking houses and outbuildings off their foundations, sweeping away all in its path, including cars; on it went, unstoppable, onto the grounds of the Pratt, Read and Co. piano factory and Sounders Sports, makers of golf equipment.

The implacable wave crashed its way into the brick factory building, shattering windows as it went, then swirled through offices and workshops, gathering up golf equipment as it went; outside, it attacked and swept away the million board-feet of lumber stacked up on the factory grounds.

Now carrying the debris of general destruction, including golf bags and lumber, the raging waters struck the bridge on Walnut Street, roared over Lilv Pond (also known as Ivory Pond) on the south side of Main Street and took down the dam there, then

careened along the Falls River and through what is now the Millrace Preserve. Sweeping up to Ivory Street, the lumber and debris and a few cars jammed up against and around the two bridges there.

The great wave had found a watercourse down Main Street, too, through Ivoryton center and east, towards the RiversEdge condominiums, undermining the street and threatening houses and lives as it went. The Bull dam succumbed to the onrushing wave, which now carried on down the Falls River and over the road towards Centerbrook, where it took down the Mill Pond dam behind Centerbrook Architects, adding the pond waters there to the already

catastrophic flood. The rain and the flood continued to roll most of that horrific night, flowing finally into North Cove and the Connecticut River.

By 6:30 am on Sunday morning, the flood waters had subsided. Neighbors came out from their homes to stand in awe as they viewed the destruction. Over two hundred million gallons of water had poured through Ivoryton in less than six hours.

Roads were washed away, pavement twisted and torn, houses leaned off their foundations; lumber was scattered everywhere; there were cars in mud drifts, there was a car in a tree.

"It looks like the end of the world," said one dazed resident.

Sailing Masters of 1812's "Burning of the Ships Commemoration"

We made it through another winter and are well into spring! With the passing of the Vernal Equinox on March 21st, we now have more hours of daylight than darkness each day! Woohoo!!!

With the coming of spring, the Sailing Masters of 1812 Fife & Drum Corps has already welcomed Essex Ed to town, has heralded "The Wearing of the Green" in the Essex-Go-Bragh Parade; and is now eagerly anticipating the annual "Burning of the Ships Commemoration" on Saturday, May 14th. Each year since 1968, the Corps has recalled the British attack on Essex on a cold April

night in 1814. Although there was no loss of life, it was a major economic blow to the town. The "Raid on Essex" during the War of 1812 was the largest naval loss our young country suffered until Pearl Harbor in December, 1941. The ships of Essex were privateer ships built specifically to harass the British. After almost two years of war, the British finally figured out that it might be easier to destroy enemy ships while moored in port, or while being built, instead of trying to chase them all around the seven seas. The British slipped up the Connecticut River in the dark of night and

torched 27 ships, as well as destroying the cordage and shipwright house, sail lofts and other structures that were an integral part of the ship-building trade. It was a disastrous blow to the town. The British also appropriated the town's considerable store of rum. It was a disastrous blow to the townspeople (Whereas the burning of the privateer ships and shipbuilding equipment might be viewed as legitimate acts of war, since the rum had nothing to do with the building of privateer ships, taking the rum was just rude.) But the resiliency of the residents of Essex was strong; and within a year they started building ships again, and continued for many years thereafter. Though nothing is mentioned in the history books, we can safely presume the town also restocked with rum... which may or may not have contributed to the resident's resiliency. This year's Burning of the Ships Commemoration will showcase a colorful parade of Fife & Drum Corps from around New England - with their flags flying proudly, while wearing the regalia of different eras in our history and headed by the Sailing Masters in their distinctive USS Constitution War of 1812 Naval Uniforms. As a special treat, the U.S. Navy Silver Dolphins Rifle Drill team from the Submarine Base in New London will perform precision rifle drill routines. The parade steps off at 2 pm from the Town Hall and marches to the trill of the fifes and the beat of the drums through downtown Essex to the flagpole at the foot of Main Street. The presentation will begin in front of the Connecticut River Museum with a brief ceremony memorializing the raid on Essex. Each of the Corps will then regale



the audience with a piece of historical music from our nation's past. This parade is a living illustration of an age gone by, and a "Do Not Miss" experience for any fans of fife & drum music and history buffs alike (Regrettably; the rum enthusiasts will be out of luck.) Many thanks to the Town of Essex and The Connecticut River Museum! We could not do this without you!

Ugly Fallen Trees in Ponds & Streams are Home to Many!

If you are fortunate to have a stream or pond on your property, even a seasonal or intermittent watercourse, you undoubtedly see the animal life it attracts. Whether herons hunting the shore, frogs calling at dusk, or dragon-flies hunting smaller bugs above the surface, it's clear that these waterbodies support life in many forms. Important components of these habitats are the natural cover for protection from predation and the sources of food in support of an extensive food chain. A pond that's barren of vegetation and submerged structure supports far less life than one with rocks, stumps, sticks, and fallen leaves on which life can feed and grow (regarding leaves, let those that fall naturally build, but don't dump - that can smother and overload with nutrients!)

When it comes to trees or branches that fall into a pond or stream, your first inclination may be to remove them. Before you do, consider that, what the CT DEEP calls "large woody debris," can be very beneficial to plants and wildlife that rely on these structures for the food that grows on them, the protection they provide, and the nesting/spawning sites they become. As an example, wood frogs lay their eggs communally on submerged branches and twigs in ponds. A barren waterbody wouldn't attract these chirping amphibians in early spring. Fish depend on structure to hide from predators. Larger fish use cover to ambush prey on which they feed. Plants on which wetlands animals feed can anchor on these woody structures, and derive nutrients from them.

So, if you see large woody debris in a pond or stream, appreciate the benefits it brings .. and maybe just let them be!

Vernal Pools Wonders of Nature

Vernal pools are temporary bodies of water categorized as a wetland that offers a habitat to a host of animal species like frogs, salamanders, turtles, snakes, birds, and numerous invertebrates. These temporary pools are bursting with activity in the warmer months

with many of these creatures breeding in the spring and summer. In the colder months these pools can provide a home for hibernation and a food source for some invertebrates like fairy shrimp and caddisflies.

- 1. In Connecticut, the state requires no disturbance of these pools 100 feet from the vernal pool edge or depression using directional corridors to enable breeding for amphibian wildlife.

Many fondly remember going to Raybestos Memorial field in Stratford, CT. Amid chants of "Joanie," the softball phenom mowed down the competition. Joan Joyce dominated women's fast pitch softball for decades - beginning her amateur career at age 13 with the Raybestos Brakettes. The Waterbury, CT native excelled at every sport she tried - a true competitor, a lifelong coach/mentor. Joyce combines an unbridled, remarkable talent with a matter of fact, humble personality. While she readily speaks about her success, there is no bragging.

Many consider her as "The Greatest Woman Athlete of All Time." Her jaw-dropping achievements/honors take pages to list, including 20 Hall of Fame inductions, Connecticut Athlete of the Year (selected by the Connecticut Sports Writers Alliance), and a softball field renamed Joan Joyce Field (a part of Municipal Stadium in Waterbury).

A LIFETIME OF ASTOUNDING ACHIEVEMENTS

Joyce's softball career covered 1954-1963 and 1967-1975 with the Brakettes and 1964-1966 with the Orange Lionettes. The slingshot pitcher notched 150 no-hitters and 50 perfect games with a lifetime earned run average of 0.09. An outstanding hitter, her career batting average is .327. In 1974, her Brakettes were the first American team to win the World Championships.

She co-founded the International Women's Professional Softball Association, being the star player for

and part-owner of the Connecticut Falcons. The Falcons won every championship of the IWPSA's existence (1976-1979).

She is a four-time Women's Basketball Association All-American and three time AAU Basketball All-American. She played on the USA Women's National Team in 1964 and 1965, setting a national tournament basketball single-game scoring record (67 points) in 1964.

She formed the Connecticut Clippers volleyball team in 1968, and competed as a player/coach. She was named to the All-East United States Volleyball Association Regional Team. Taking up golf at age 35, she spent 19 years on the LPGA tour (1977-1995). She still holds the LPGA and PGA record of just 17 putts in one round of golf.

Now 80, Joyce is the women's softball coach at Florida Atlantic University. Starting the program from scratch in 1994, she has amassed 12 Conference Championships, participated in 11 NCCA Tournaments, and won 8 Coach-of-the Year Awards.

THE SECRET TO SUCCESS?

"I don't know," she says. "The only thing I can say about me is that I am very competitive. . . . I will beat you at just about everything. If you beat me, I'd shake hands. But I'd say to myself, you are not going to beat me a second time."

Her mother worked days. She, her father (above) and brother played sports all the time. "We would end up going to my father's softball games," she recalls. "We had no gloves. We'd run around everywhere while my father was playing. When they came in from the field, they'd put the gloves under the bench. We'd take them and start catching. When they went back in the field, they'd have to come and get the gloves back from us." When her father played basketball, she and her brother would wait for the halftime buzzer and then fly onto the court to play.

Striking Out Ted Williams/Hank Aaron. She calls striking out Ted Williams (left) and Hank Aaron her favorite moments. "It's the easiest thing I've ever done in my life," she relates. "They had no chance against a softball pitcher just because of the distance." She faced Williams as part

of fundraisers in 1961 and 1966; Aaron in 1978 in a West Hartford exhibition. There were no radar guns then. A doctorate study from USC determined her pitching speed to be the equivalent of 119 mph in baseball.

Invited to China by the All-China Sports Federation (1979).

"It was the first team ever invited to China," she recalls of the Connecticut Falcons. "When we played our last game sixty thousand people came to the game. I was looking out and it was like a flood of people just coming and coming and coming. And I'm thinking, 'Oh, my God!" The American team won all six games. In the final game, Joyce pitched a no-hitter to beat the Chinese all-star team.

Joyce pitched a no hitter against Australia. "Only one walk. And we picked her off," notes Joyce. "It would have been a perfect game." She also stymied Japan, giving up only two hits. No team wore helmets then. Japan showed up wearing them. Was it to distract her or out of fear of her? "It didn't work," she laughs. "You did not want to get me focused or to get my attention. Stare at me? Give me looks? I would say to myself,

keep doing that 'cause you're never going to beat me. I just didn't like to lose."
