Finally, spring has arrived!

I encourage you to spend time outdoors enjoying the serenity of our beautiful Town and check out all the upcoming events that the warm weather brings. The Garden Club's May Market will be held in Main Street Park in Essex on Saturday, May 13th at 8:00 am – 1:00 pm. Explore the many Essex Land Trust trails and visit our

Town parks. The Burning of the Ships, Memorial Day, and the July 4th parades have been scheduled and the Ivoryton Farmers Market will take place on the Ivoryton Village Green on Saturdays from June through October. Considering summer activities for the kids? Our Park & Recreation Department has a fantastic summer camp for children in grades K-8. Visit the Connecticut River Museum, make plans to take a ride on the Essex Steam Train, or see a show at the Ivoryton Playhouse. While you are out and about, shop the local boutiques and visit our fine restaurants. Our small town has much to offer.

The 2023-2024 Annual Budget is in progress.

As always, the Town's goal is to continue to meet the needs and expectations of our residents while keeping expenditures as low as possible. The final budget went to a Public Hearing on April 20, 2023, at 7:30 pm and will then be voted on by residents at the Annual Town Budget Meeting on Monday May 8, 2023, at 7:30 pm. The Region 4 Budget Referendum for Essex residents will be on May 2nd from 6:00 am – 8:00 pm at the Essex Town Hall. For more detailed information about the budget please check the Town and Region 4 websites.

The Town is preparing for two upcoming projects.

The Town was awarded a \$500,000 dollar grant through the Small Town Economic Assistance Program (STEAP) for the Essex Civic Campus Enhancement project phase II which consists of **improvements to Hubbard Park**. The project will include new fencing, additional parking, pedestrian pathways, new concessions, ADA compliant restrooms, and equipment storage along with landscaping improvements.

We are also hoping to start the **River Road Sidewalk project**. The Town was awarded a connectivity grant to extend the sidewalk from 5 River Rd. to 85 River Rd. The project will include a pedestrian bridge to cross the Falls

Just a Reminder... Dog License Renewals Due in June



2023-2024 Dog License Renewals

will be due from June 1st to June 30th, 2023. (No early renewals

prior to June 1st.) We would appreciate it if you mailed in your request due to the volume.

Up-to-date Rabies vaccine information will also be required as well as any current spayed or neutered procedures.

For those residents with current registered dogs, we will be sending out a renewal letter in late May. Please refer to the expiration date of each dog's vaccine certificate on your renewal form, making sure that it is not expired on July 1, 2023, the first day of licensing for the new year.

The cost to register a dog is \$8.00 for a neutered / spayed dog and \$19.00 for a dog which has not yet been neutered / spayed.

Please note...

Keeping dogs licensed is required by State Statute 22-338 and not just a way to identify lost dogs. It is also a matter of safety, for pets and their owners. Thank you for your consideration.

From the Assessors' Office

2023 Town of Essex Reassessment Update

Per Connecticut General Statutes the Town of Essex is required to reassess all properties at current market value as of October 1, 2023. Therefore, the sales in the year prior to October 1, 2023 (10-01-2022 through 09-30-2023) will be reviewed and used to establish new property values.



Connecticut State Statutes require that all real estate within the jurisdiction of a municipality be reassessed every five years. The main purpose being to rebalance any inequities that may have developed since the last reassessment (2018). A town that does not implement a required reassessment is at risk of losing certain grant money and is subject to various penalties.

Reassessment is a revenue neutral process. A significant increase / decrease in a property's assessed value will not result in an equivalent increase / decrease in the property's taxes. The total amount the town needs to collect through taxes for the support of our schools and local government is determined by the town budget regardless of whether a reassessment takes place or not.

The data collection phase of our state mandated reassessment is under way. All residential property owners should have received their "2023 Revaluation – Residential Data Verification Report." These letters were mailed the first week of January with a request to return within 10 days of receipt. If you have not already done so, please read, indicate any changes, sign, and return your form as soon as possible.

If you have already returned your mailer, we appreciate your cooperation. Please note that any changes you may have made to your information will not be reflected on the website until the revaluation is completed later this year.

Real Estate Tax Relief - Persons Totally Disabled or Over Age 65

State of Connecticut Circuit Breaker Program

The Assessor's Office is accepting applications for the State of Connecticut Circuit Breaker program until May 15th. To qualify for this program a person must be totally disabled or age 65 by December 31, 2022. In the case of a married couple, only one spouse needs to be 65. The total household qualifying income, including any Social Security benefits, must be less than \$49,100 for a married couple; and less than \$40,300 for a single person.

The property that you are seeking assistance for must be your primary residence.

Once qualified for the State Circuit Breaker Program, you are also eligible for the Town of Essex matching benefit.




The amount of tax relief is a sliding scale based on total qualifying income. For example, if a married couple had a total qualifying income of \$22,000 for calendar year 2022, they may be eligible for assistance from the State of up to \$1,000. The \$1,000 would be taken off the tax bill and the Town would match that benefit up to 100%, depending on age and years in the current primary residence. The tax bill could be reduced by as much as \$2,000.

If you, or someone you know, might be eligible for this benefit, please have them mail their information or come to the Assessor's Office at Town Hall with their 2022 SSA 1099, and proof of any income earned in calendar year 2022 or a copy of their 2022 tax return prior to May 15, 2023.

Elementary School Foundation Supports New Math Specialist Position at Elementary School

The Essex Elementary School Foundation (EESF) has funded a math specialist position as part of its goal to expand interest and skills-based learning in STEM.

Shannon VanderMale, current Essex Elementary School math coach, will take on the additional role of math specialist (a one-year granted position by EESF) to encourage students to problem-solve using the skills they have learned in their math lessons. Shannon will produce different math problem-solving tasks that allow students to use their existing mathematics skills in new and creative ways. Some of the STEM related tasks designed will be "non-curricular," meaning they will



not be linked to specific math lessons, but instead challenge learners to approach problems at different entry points using a range of strategies they have been taught in school.

The purpose of these math tasks is to stimulate creative problem-solving, rather than having students simply mimic what they have learned in class. She will also be incorporating STEM lessons that blend mathematical concepts into each grade-level science curriculum. This will allow students to engage in science tasks that include key math concepts at each grade level.

Over the next few months, students and parents can expect to see the first set of problem-solving tasks in

each grade level. Shannon will also begin to establish this Summer's Math Passport Planning as well as a first set of STEM-integrated lessons which she aims to introduce in early spring.

The Essex Foundation \$3000 Environmental Scholarship

The Essex Foundation is now accepting applications for the **2023 Elizabeth Barnes Callender and Mary Francis Barnes Scholarship**. The \$3000 annual award was established in 2019 upon a bequest in memory of the two sisters who were Essex residents deeply committed to land conservation and preservation.


The scholarship is available to one Valley Regional High School graduating senior or graduate, or an Essex resident, who is pursuing studies related to land conservation and preservation at a two or four-year college, a technical school, or graduate school, or taking accredited courses. Fields of study may include biology, botany, agronomy, ecology, horticulture, floriculture, forestry, landscape design, or environmental science. To be considered for this year's award, applicants must submit materials to The Essex Foundation no later than May 10. 



FDA Food Code Arrives in Connecticut

On February 17, 2023, Connecticut officially adopted the FDA Food Code into law.



The law requires ALL food establishments, temporary food establishments, and certified food inspectors in CT to comply with the most recent version of the FDA Food Code. This is a good thing for CT, as it provides the latest food safety guidance and best practices for new and emerging food preparation

techniques and food safety challenges. There is no "*grand-fathering*" of former practices, and all food establishments SHALL comply with the most recent version of the FDA Food Code.

The adoption of the FDA Food Code results in a variety of changes for food establishment owners, operators, and their staff. The Food Code places a high priority on employee training and knowledge of the risk factors that contribute to foodborne illness. The Food Code addresses controls for risk factors and establishes public health interventions to protect consumer health.

All food service establishments are advised to become familiar with and comply with the FDA Food Code which is available online at: https://www.fda.gov/food/fda-food-code/food-code-2022. In March 2023, the Essex Health Department's certified food inspector began inspecting establishments based on the requirements defined in the FDA Food Code.

The Essex Health Department will continue to work with food establishments and their staff as we all navigate this new process and collectively work to ensure the health and safety of the public while implementing the new requirements.

Who is Required to Comply with the FDA Food Code?

If your food establishment, business, organization, entity, or activity meets any of the following criteria, then, you SHALL comply with the FDA Food Code. All food establishments SHALL obtain an annual permit from the local health department. Operators of a temporary food establishment SHALL obtain a permit from the local health dept a minimum of 14 days prior to the temporary event. NO EXCEPTIONS.

Food establishment means an operation that:

- (a) stores, prepares, packages, serves, vends FOOD directly to the CONSUMER, or otherwise provides FOOD for human consumption such as a restaurant; satellite or catered feeding location; catering operation if the operation provides FOOD directly to a CONSUMER or to a conveyance used to transport people; market; vending location; conveyance used to transport people; institution; or FOOD bank; and
- (b) relinquishes possession of FOOD to a CONSUMER directly, or indirectly through a delivery service such as home delivery of grocery orders or restaurant takeout orders, or delivery service that is provided by common carriers.

Food establishment includes:

- (a) An element of the operation such as a transportation vehicle or a central preparation facility that supplies a vending location or satellite feeding location unless the vending or feeding location is permitted by the REGULATORY AUTHORITY; and
- (b) An operation that is conducted in a mobile, stationary, temporary, or permanent facility or location; where consumption is on or off the PREMISES; and regardless of whether there is a charge for the FOOD.

Temporary food establishment means a FOOD ESTABLISHMENT that operates for a period of no more than 14 consecutive days in conjunction with a single event or celebration.

The following businesses, organizations and entities

are not food establishments as defined by the FDA Food

- (a) An establishment that offers only PREPACKAGED FOODS that are not TIME/ TEMPERATURE CONTROL FOR SAFETY FOODS (TTCSF)
- (b) A produce stand that only offers whole, uncut fresh fruits and vegetables
- (c) A FOOD PROCESSING PLANT; including those that are located on the PREMISES of a FOOD ESTABLISHMENT
- (d) A kitchen in a private home if only FOOD that is not TTCSF, is prepared for sale or service at a function such as a religious or charitable organization's bake sale and if the CONSUMER is informed by a clearly visible placard at the sales or service location that the FOOD is prepared in a kitchen that is not subject to regulation and inspection by the REGULATORY AUTHORITY
- (e) An area where FOOD that is prepared as specified in(d) above, is sold or offered for human consumption
- (f) A kitchen in a private home, such as a small family day-care provider; or a bed-and-breakfast operation that prepares and offers FOOD to guests if the home is owner occupied, the number of available guest bedrooms does not exceed 6, breakfast is the only

- meal offered, the number of guests served does not exceed 18, and the CONSUMER is informed by statements contained in published advertisements, mailed brochures, and placards posted at the registra tion area that the FOOD is prepared in a kitchen that is not regulated and inspected by the REGULATORY AUTHORITY; or
- (g) A private home that receives catered or home-delivered FOOD



Probate Fees 101

The Probate Court becomes involved when a person dies in order to assist with transferring assets from the name of the deceased person to his or her heirs or beneficiaries under a Will.

In our court, which serves a population of approximately 62,000, we saw a rise in decedent's estate matters with the onset of the Covid pandemic, moving from 1,419 decedent's estates in 2019 to 1,523 in 2020 and eventually 2,371 in 2021.

There is much information and misinformation about what the cost is to invoke the assistance of the Probate Court in a

decedent's estate matter. Calculating probate fees is very fact specific, but it is my hope that the guidelines below will assist court users in understanding how fees might be assessed for their own estates.

In a hypothetical scenario where the husband of a couple dies first, and the couple owns a house valued at \$500,000, a joint bank account valued at \$100,000, a jointly owned car valued at \$20,000, and the husband has a retirement account valued at \$350,000, all of which pass to his surviving spouse, the probate fee would be calculated as follows: half of the value of the jointly owned assets are attributed to the husband's estate, namely house, bank account and car, or (\$250,000 + \$50,000 + \$10,000 = \$310,000). The retirement account is solely owned, so its entire value of \$350,000 is added to the \$310,000 in joint assets = \$660,000. Since all property passes to the surviving spouse, the \$660,000 in value of the husband's assets is reduced by half, and becomes \$330,000. Using the table on this page, the probate fee is then calculated as follows: (\$330,000 - \$10,000)*0.0035 = \$1,120.00 + \$150.00 = \$1,270.00

The online calculator is useful, but calculating probate fees is most accurately done by a skilled probate clerk at your local court.






Tri-Town Cub Scouts Pack 13 Join Our Fun-Filled 2023!

over to pick up a bottle or two of the Club's legendary Garlic Salt. This has been sold out since last fall and a new supply will be available at May Market – but after that, it can only be bought at Gracie's Corner for as long as the supply lasts. This is a reminder to those of you who were disappointed when you tried to find our Garlic Salt for Christmas gifts last year.

If you're looking for variety, don't miss the popular jewelry tent which is expanding this year to include scarves, handbags, and belts; Treasures where you can find bargains galore; and the Boutique which will be offering some more up-market items to purchase.

And because the Garden Club is also an educational organization, don't forget to stop by the Conservation Tent to get information on how to identify invasive plants; suggestions for the best shrubs and plants for bees throughout the season; information on where to buy native plants, and more.

May Market is an all hands on deck fundraiser for the Essex Garden Club, and provides the funds that are used for scholarships (\$5,000 scholarships this year) and Town Beautification.

Conservation Commission Opportunities

The Essex Conservation Commission manages three preserves open to the public during daylight hours. Whether you want to hike a variety of terrains, explore different forests and waterways, bird watch or walk your dog, these activities are available all four seasons at Bushy Hill Preserve in Ivoryton, or Canfield Meadow Woods and Viney Hill Brook Preserves in Essex.

Our commission is actively seeking additional members to help us manage these preserves. We meet the second Thursday of each month at Essex Town Hall to discuss issues relating to grounds and landscaping within the preserves as well as to the administration of subcontractors hired to help keep the preserves safe and enjoyable.

Commissioners meet, periodically, at one of the preserves, walk the trails, complete light pruning and make structural repairs as needed. Field meetings are usually an hour or so in length and are usually conducted in the warmer months.

Inland Wetlands & Watercourses Commission

Permitts? We Don't Need No Stinkin' Permits!

Well, if you're old enough to remember that edgy movie, "Blazing Saddles," the line was actually "Badges" not "Permits!" That noted, it's understood that there may be questions as to why the Town requires permits for working in and around wetlands and watercourses (streams and ponds.) In prior articles, we touched on the value of these resources – helping to absorb run-off nutrients and control pollution, providing an environment for wildlife, reducing flood risks, and providing recreational opportunities (think fishing, hiking, birdwatching, etc.).

SO, WHAT'S INVOLVED IN A PERMIT?

The process starts with assessing your property for presence of regulated areas. Streams and ponds are clearly recognized. Marshes, bogs, intermittent streams, and even forested wet areas are also designated, through soil testing. The Town's GIS map (found on the home page of www.essexct.gov) shows many of those areas. Others may require soil testing and flagging by a Soil Scientist. The Town's Land Use Office can assist you in identifying regulated areas. The State of CT delegates management of these areas + the "upland review area", 100 feet out from wetlands in Essex. The Town's Land Use Office Staff and the Inland Wetlands and Watercourses Commission (IWWC) administers those regulations on behalf of the State.

If you're planning activities in wetlands or surrounding area, then an application must be submitted to the Land Use Office. The office staff will help you understand the application. Know that you may need to hire a Soil Scientist, depending on the state of wetlands mapping on your property and the disruption you plan.

Once the application is complete and fee paid (part of which is designated to the State), the application is officially received by the Town and IWWC at a meeting of the Commission. The IWWC will then schedule an approval review or a public hearing/review at the next monthly meeting. In the interim, it is common for the IWWC and Land Use staff to seek accommodations for protection of wetlands, during and after construction, for the applicant to incorporate into their plan. The IWWC's mission is to protect the resources, and that's what the permit process is really about... not red tape nor collecting fees but giving the Town an opportunity to work with property owners. Very few applications are turned down, and most do receive guidance on property protection as part of the process.



The "Forgotten Battle of the War of 1812"

The Battle of Essex is known as the "Forgotten Battle of the War of 1812."

DON'T TELL THAT TO THE SAILING MASTERS OF 1812! WE AND THE TOWN OF ESSEX WILL NEVER FORGET!

Our annual "Burning of the Ships Commemoration" held in the spring recalls when the British slipped up the Connecticut River on a cold, dark April night and torched 27 ships, as well as destroying the cordage and shipwright house, sail lofts and other structures that were an essential part of the ship-building trade. The British even took the Town's supply of rum.

This year the Sailing Masters are proudly taking to the streets of Essex on May 13th to once again honor those who bore the brunt of the British fury during the war. The ships of Essex were privateer ships built specifically to harass the British and evade their blockade during the War of 1812. This made the British just a wee bit indignant toward those 'American Upstarts,' resulting in the "Raid on Essex," the largest naval loss our young country suffered until Pearl Harbor in December, 1941.

There are those who sometimes refer to this Commemoration as "Loser's Day." Let's be fair. War was a muddled business on both sides - with hindsight being 20 / 20. It took the British almost two years of chasing our ships around a rather large ocean before finally figuring out that it might be easier to destroy enemy ships while they are anchored in a harbor, or while being built. We on the other hand may have had better luck fending off the assault if we actually had soldiers in our fort at the mouth of the Connecticut River. Empty forts with no soldiers inside to fire upon the enemy almost never repel attackers. Ask anyone who owns a fort.

While admittedly, it may not have been our finest hour, I would challenge those who have never stared down the musket barrels, swivel guns, and carronades (and feel free to toss in a few sharp cutlasses) of 136 British Sailors and Marines: "What would you

expect the townspeople to do?" Not even our most ardent patriots ever declared: "Give me rum or give me death!" And, though it was a disastrous blow to the town, the resolute inhabitants of Essex responded with the defiant attitude: "Don't get mad. Get even." And they quickly began building ships again.

This year's Burning of the Ships Commemoration will present a gathering of lively and colorful Fife & Drum Corps, with their flags flying proudly, and wearing the uniforms and dress of various eras in our history - led by the Sailing Masters in their distinctive USS Constitution War of 1812 Naval Uniforms. As a special treat, the U.S. Navy Silver Dolphins Rifle Drill team from the submarine base in New London will march with us and perform precision rifle drill routines.

The parade steps off on May 13th at 2:00 pm from the Town Hall and marches down Main Street to the trill of the fifes and the beat of the drums to the flagpole at the foot of Main Street. he presentation will begin in front of the Connecticut River Museum with a brief ceremony memorializing the raid on Essex. Each of the Corps will then take a turn treating the audience to a tune from our nation's past. Don't miss this piece of living history from an age gone by - for fans of fife & drum music and history buffs alike.

Emergency Management

Prepare for Power Outages this Spring

Eversource - Electricity Transmission & Distribution Company

Electricity to your property comes from Eversource not the Town of Essex. If you lose power, report the outage directly to Eversource - even if you think a neighbor already reported it. Eversource will calculate how many customers are without power in an area, assign a priority level and repair crew, and will provide customers with an estimated time for restoration.

Broken Pole / Downed Power Line

The Town of Essex cannot repair a broken pole or reconnect a downed power line - only Eversource crews can perform this work. Town crews will only clear branches and debris from roadways if there are no wires or other safety hazards. Eversource crews must first verify downed wires are de-energized before the Town crew can work safely and clear roads. This takes time. Always be situationally aware of the dangers associated with downed wires and be prepared for prolonged outages. Know alternate routes to and from your home.

Safety is your responsibility

- 1. Stay far away from fallen tree limbs and electrical wires; assume all downed wires are "live."
- 2. NEVER drive over fallen wires or around a barricade and NEVER move or relocate a barricade. Barricades are intentionally placed for your protection and signify danger ahead. Use an alternate route to get to your destination
- 3. Operate power generators outside of the home and adhere to all safety procedures

Beach Association's Guide Provides Information on a Wide Range of Coastal Topics

The Land and Water Resources Division (LWRD) has developed another valuable resource, the Connectiout Beach Association's Guide to Coastal Activities and Permitting, to help protect coastal resources and avoid potential violations of the DEEP's coastal regulatory programs.





Similar to the <u>Coastal Property Owner's Guide</u>, the goal of this guide is to educate members of beach associations about the federal, state, and local permits that may be required before they undertake certain activities on their property. The information contained in the guide regarding common activities such as beach raking and storm response will hopefully protect against future enforcement actions and will protect coastal resources from adverse impacts associated with unauthorized activities, such as fill in tidal wetlands or coastal waters.

Although the guide was developed with beach associations in mind, we strongly encourage Sound Outlook readers to view the guide, which also provides general information on interesting topics such as protecting dunes, nesting shorebirds, and horseshoe crabs. When we know better, we can do better.
