Dear Friends and Neighbors,

Finally, spring has arrived! I encourage you to spend time outdoors enjoying the serenity of our beautiful Town and check out all the upcoming events that the warm weather brings. The Garden Club's May Market will be on Saturday, May 11 8:00 am – 2:00 pm at Main Street Park in Essex. Explore the Essex Land Trust trails

The Burning of the Ships, Memorial Day, and the July 4th parades have been scheduled and the Ivoryton Farmers Market will take place on the Ivoryton Village Green on Saturdays from June through October. The 2024-2025 Annual Budget is in progress. As always, the Town's goal is to continue to meet the needs and expectations of

our residents while keeping expenses as low as possible. The final budget went to a Public Hearing on April 18 at 7:30 pm and will be voted on by residents at the Annual Budget Town Meeting on May 13 at 7:30 pm. The Region 4 Budget Referendum for Essex residents will be on May 7 from 12-8 pm at the Essex Town Hall. I encourage you to participate in all these important budget events. The schedule of budget meetings can be found on the Town website, www.essexct.gov.

The Town is preparing for two upcoming projects. The Essex Civic Campus Enhancement project phase II consists of improvements to Hubbard Park. The project will include new fencing, additional parking, pedestrian pathways, new concessions, ADA compliant restrooms, and equipment storage along with enhanced landscaping. We will also begin the installation of the pedestrian bridge across the Falls River on River Road. We anticipate both projects getting underway this summer.

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
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Assessor's Office

Real Estate Tax Relief – Persons Totally Disabled or Over Age 65

The Assessor's Office is accepting applications for the State of Connecticut Circuit Breaker program *until April 17th for mailing and May 15th for walk-ins*. To qualify for this program a person must be totally disabled or age 65 by December 31, 2023. In the case of a married couple, only one spouse needs to be 65. The total household qualifying income, including any Social Security benefits, must be less than \$53,400 for a married couple; and less than \$43,800 for a single person.

The property that you are seeking assistance for must be your primary residence.

Once qualified for the State Circuit Breaker Program, you are also eligible for the Town of Essex matching benefit.

The amount of tax relief is a sliding scale based on total qualifying income. For example, if a married couple had a total qualifying income of \$22,000 for calendar year 2023, they may be eligible for assistance from the State of up to \$1,000. The \$1,000 would be taken off the tax bill and the Town would match that benefit up to 100%, depending on age and years in the current primary residence. The tax bill could be reduced by as much as \$2,000.

If you, or someone you know, might be eligible for this benefit, please have them mail their information or come to the Assessor's

Office at Town Hall with their 2023 SSA 1099, and proof of any income earned in calendar year 2023 or a copy of their 2023 tax return prior to May 15, 2024.

We look forward to the opportunity to assist you.



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ESSEX GARDEN CLUB Annual May Market Returns on May 11, 2024





2024-2025 Dog License Renewals



Dog License Renewals will be due from June 1 to June 30, 2024. (There are no early renewals before Jun 1.) Due to the volume of licenses, we would appreciate it if you mailed in your renewal.

Up-to-date rabies vaccine information and any current spayed or neutered procedures will also be required.

For residents with current registered dogs, we will send out a renewal letter in late May. Please refer to the expiration date of each dog's vaccine certificate on your renewal form, making sure it does not expire on or before July 1, 2024, the first day of licensing for the new year.

The cost to register a dog is \$8.00 for a neutered/spayed dog and \$19.00 for a dog that has not yet been neutered/spayed.

State Statute 22-338 requires dogs to be licensed. Licensing is not just a way to identify lost dogs, it is also a matter of safety for pets and their owners.

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


Essex residents had a chance to try out environmentally friendly electric lawn equipment at an event organized by Essex Land Trust (ELT) and Sustainable Essex. With fall cleanups in mind, more than 30 people came to Cross Lots in Essex on Saturday November 4 to see and try out battery-operated leaf blowers, lawn mowers, string trimmers and a chain saw. Essex Land Trust's Tom Soboleski and Anne Penniman from Sustainable Essex spearheaded the event.

"We are excited about the positive momentum building for electric lawn equipment, which is more convenient and user-friendly than gas-powered," said landscape architect Anne Penniman. "There's minimal maintenance, no fuel, and no exhaust." The Town of Essex has purchased electrical equipment, and Sustainable Essex is working with it to obtain more. ELT has also been purchasing battery operated equipment to replace gas powered machines.

"We have concerns about the health issues created by pollution for anyone using gas-powered leaf blowers especially. The 2-stroke engines emit the same toxic pollutants in an hour as driving a new passenger car for about 1,100 miles!" Anne said. Unlike vehicle engines whose emissions are regulated, two-stroke engines are not. Consumer-grade blowers (and some mowers) use a two-stroke engine, which lacks an independent lubrication system, so fuel must be mixed with oil. Burning oil and fuel emits several harmful toxic pollutants into the air, including carbon monoxide, nitrous oxides (which cause smog formation and acid rain), and hydrocarbons (a carcinogenic gas that also causes smog).

Gas-powered blowers also create dangerous amounts of noise which compromise our quality of life in our small-town setting. They can cause hearing damage after two hours of operation. The Centers for Disease Control and others report that the typical gas-powered leaf blower emits 85 decibels of noise, far higher than acknowledged safety standards and four times as loud as an average electric leaf blower.



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Anne had tips for those using a landscaping service. She owns an electric blower, string trimmer and other landscape equipment. "I asked my lawn service to refrain from using blowers during the summer season. I've also asked my landscape contractor to use my battery-powered blower only when necessary, such as on a gravel driveway," she said. In the fall, the leaves are left in planting beds and mulch is mowed into the lawn for added nutrient benefits. You can protect your plants for the winter, and also have

free mulch which will naturally break down to rich humus that will feed the woody and perennial plantings.

The equipment is also efficient. Addressing concerns that battery-powered equipment is not powerful enough, Sustainable Essex knows of six electric landscape firms in the state of Connecticut that all use the equipment with success. One of the companies reports a 30% annual growth over 10 years.

hatchbed Island is a tidal wetland on the western bank of the Connecticut River just south of the Town of Essex. This island has been part of the history of the region as the salt meadow barrier between the river, Middle Cove, and South Cove. The earliest maps of Essex show the Island as a reed bed extending almost 30 acres in an arc from Essex to the middle of South Cove. Today, Thatchbed Island is under threat from natural and anthropogenic threats, rapid erosion, and loss of biological diversity. It is diminished in size to less than seven acres, with visible loss of vegetation each year. What is happening to this island marsh and what does this mean for the ecology of the Lower Connecticut River environs?

Riverine marshes such as Thatchbed Island are characterized by their dynamic nature. Accumulated sediments are barely above the waterline with flooding by tidal action. The marshes, sandbars and floodplains around the Town of Essex are truly estuarine and are increasingly influenced by saltwater with sea level rise. Since the Town of Essex was settled in 1635, sea level has risen over 26 inches. Glacial gravels and sands built up to a level above the waterline to support marsh plants made up of primarily grasses, sedges, and herbs. While plants can anchor and trap sediment, parts of these marsh islands can be eroded and moved with severe floods and ice flows. The agents of change for these river marshes include major flood events, tidal storm surges, and rising sea level. All these agents of change have impacted how people have used and viewed Thatchbed Island.

In the nineteenth and early 20th century, salt meadows throughout the northeastern seaboard were used for grazing livestock and cutting salt grass hay. Tidal marshlands were burned to maintain a dominance of grasses and sedges. After the second world war, commercial interests eyed Thatchbed Island as an ideal location for a large marina created by dredge and fill material. Residents of Essex opposed this marina, prompting

Captain Walter Rowe to purchase the northern end of Thatchbed Island and in 1968, Captain Rowe donated his part of Thatchbed Island to The Essex Conservation Trust, now the Essex Land Trust (ELT). About this time, an invasive reed Phragmites australis became a dominant grass on many tidal and non-tidal wetlands in Connecticut. The State of Connecticut took aggressive action to battle this invasive species on Thatchbed Island by spraying with an herbicide for a period of four years starting in 2000. The loss of the Phragmites along with the failure of native species to recolonize may have contributed to the island's rapid erosion.

The land trust focused its stewardship on Osprey conservation with the construction of nesting platforms. The popular Osprey camera was installed in the early 2000s to introduce the Town to the wonders of Osprey parenthood from April to July each year. The nesting platforms and ELT stewardship have contributed to the recovery of Osprey on the Lower Connecticut River.

A 2018 report for the Essex Harbor Commission on Thatchbed Island brought attention to the rapid deterioration of the island. An immediate concern was the loss or movement of sediment around the island and the need to maintain navigable waterways. Thatchbed Island has been used historically for dumping of dredged materials, yet the study concluded that the island had no high marsh areas, and it lacked the distinct high and low marsh zonation seen on the Great Meadow protecting North Cove. Wash-over debris brings both natural material (logs and other loose vegetation) as well as plastic debris down the river. The report addressed the impact of boat wakes and storms on the instability of the eastern shoreline of the island, with erosion reducing the extent of the island. Why has Thatchbed Island eroded so quickly over the past 25 years, and should the Town of Essex be concerned about the demise of the island entirely?

Fortunately, in 2024, we may have some answers. The Connecticut

Department of Energy and Environmental Protection has contracted a year-long research study of Thatchbed Island to be carried out by the University of Connecticut's CIRCA (Connecticut Institute for Resilience and Climate Adaptation). A team of researchers with expertise in physical oceanography and modeling river flow and sediment transport will seek to identify and understand the root causes contributing to erosion. The Research was scheduled to begin in February 2024, and by the end of the year will publish the potential solutions aimed at mitigating the erosion issues.

Everyone enjoying the views of the river, boating, or watching the Ospreys will be impacted by the fate of Thatchbed Island. This tidal marsh is one small part of the changing environment around us, and solving the mystery of its demise will inform future actions that may be needed to preserve the beauty around us.


The volume of free rides given has continued to increase to 87 per month for January and February 2024, close to pre-pandemic numbers of rides. We have added new drivers but could use more.

We do not have the land to fit a ramp on the property but we are trying our best to give you the safest possible entry.

Essex Planning and Zoning Commission

The Planning & Zoning Commission is having a very active 2024 thus far. We have heard many individual applications for small business and residential improvements, and we are addressing zoning issues that will help protect the Town and direct future growth to areas that can handle the new businesses and residents.

During the past year we have approved two new industrial buildings, which will add jobs and an increased tax base for the community. We have also approved the opening of many small businesses throughout town and the creation of a 3-lot subdivision where the Essex Spa used to be located. As part of this work, our Town Planner, John Guszkowski, and our Land Use Official, Carey Duques, are working on obtaining grants for

infrastructure improvements (i.e. the sidewalks on River Road).

This year the Planning & Zoning Commission will begin a decennial review of the Town's Plan of Conservation and Development (POCD) which serves as the vision of our community as we grow and change. There will be numerous public hearings with opportunities for the public to weigh in with their vision of our town. We will advertise the meetings and hope you can join in the conversation.

The Planning & Zoning Commission meets the first Tuesday of each month in the Town Hall. The agendas for these meetings are

As you travel around Town, you may see an increase in road work signs, large trucks with flashing lights, orange cones and workers in bright clothes. Construction is an inconvenience and causes delays, but it is necessary to improve and maintain our infrastructure.


Please PAY ATTENTION while you are driving. Control the speed of your vehicle and be cautious while driving in work zones. Please respect what our employees and contractors are trying to accomplish. Most speed limits on our Town roads are 25 MPH. If you are traveling through a work zone you should be driving slower than the speed limit.

Our upcoming road paving projects will be the repaving of Summit, Chestnut, Blake, and Oak Streets. We will also be replacing various sections of deteriorated sidewalks before the paving begins. This is the final paving restoration of the CT Water Co. water main replacement project. Drainage improvements will also be made before we begin paving. You will see Town crews at the site throughout the spring preparing the roads before the repaving project begins.

Essex has always prided itself on being a very walkable community. We have seen a significant increase in pedestrian travel. If you are a pedestrian or cyclist, keep yourself visible; wear bright clothes and choose safe routes; be cautious at intersections and use the sidewalk whenever possible. Drivers, please give our pedestrians the right of way and share the roadway.

The Town of Essex Public Works Department depends on you to be a responsible driver and help keep our employees and pedestrians safe on roadways. 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


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THE CONNECTICUT SEA MUSIC FESTIVAL


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The Essex Foundation Helps Fund Valley Unified Buddies Life Skills Trip to Disney

Awards \$10,000 Grant to Underwrite Student Travel Expenses

In March 2024, 23 local area teens took the ultimate life skills trip to Disney World in Florida thanks to the organizational efforts of Valley Unified Buddies and a \$10,000 grant award from The Essex Foundation. Valley Unified Buddies is a nonprofit group made up of Unified Sports, a registered program of Special Olympics, and Valley Buddies. The group provides high school students with intellectual and developmental disabilities every opportunity to succeed in school, their jobs and in life. They are provided a safe space to play team sports and are paired with peer mentors. Together, they enjoy team dinners, movie nights, football game outings, and other organized activities including a Unified prom open to other special needs kids from surrounding schools.

"Valley Unified Buddies is so grateful to The Essex Foundation for partnering with us," said Susan Strecker, President of the non-profit Valley Unified Buddies booster club. "It is only with their support and generosity that our kids were able to go on this ultimate life skills trip to Disney World. A big part of our mission is awareness and inclusion. The Essex Foundation is a huge part of helping us achieve these goals."

A once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for most students, the entire trip was designed for them to put everything they've been learning into practice - from following directions to get through security; to displaying proper social behavior while traveling by airplane and during the hotel stay; to planning their time and paying for meals. The cost of \$2400 per student was prohibitive for some. Every \$10,000 raised reduced the cost for each of the 21 students by \$400.

"It was a unanimous decision by our board members to approve the grant request,"

commented The Essex Foundation President Bruce Glowac. "Even though the request is a little beyond our purview, we felt strongly about doing our part to positively impact young people in our community."

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Tri-Town Youth Services Welcomes New Director



I have been telling people, "It's like coming full circle, ish." That is how I describe becoming the Executive Director for Tri-Town Youth Services, noting that I had interviewed for the position way back in the fall of 1990, when I had no business even applying for the position. At that time the only experience I had working with youth in any capacity was

coaching and officiating sports. For the next 32-plus years, as I was working in various youth development roles, directors Gail Onofrio Beck and Allison Abramson were busy building Tri-Town Youth Services into a dynamic and invaluable community resource.

When Allison started a new position in April 2023 and her replacement left after only four months to take a position with the state, I stepped down from the Board of Directors to serve as the interim director. From the start I was being encouraged by numerous people to consider becoming the full-time director. Additional staff departures eventually prompted me to stay on, and I was appointed by the board in January. I don't know if

that is being called, pulled or pushed, but ultimately it felt right: This is my community. I have lived in one of the three towns my entire life. I have served in several civic roles, know many of the key stakeholders, and remain committed to fostering the development and well-being of all children.

Like many non profits, we face funding and staffing challenges, yet I remain optimistic about our ability to meet them. Youth Service Bureaus have always had to be nimble to adjust to the changing landscape of community needs and resource allocations. Even with recent departures our remaining staff have worked diligently and creatively to maintain most of the programming that has been in place for several years. Change is inevitable and we will adapt and persevere. We may have some new faces and a reconfigured menu of services, but we will continue to be a potent and reliable resource for our youth, families and community partners.

A Connecticut Tradition



drum corps, with their shrill sounds of fifes and the boom of drums, as they seem to be part of every parade. But did you know that Connecticut residents sit in the

epicenter of fife and drum activity and history?

The use of fife and drums in the military in Europe and the US has a long history. But after the Civil War, US veterans began to come together to form civilian fife and drum corps for recreational purposes. In time, fife and drum corps could be found in most towns on the east coast and associated with many companies, civic groups, schools, boy scouts and more.

Ivoryton is home to the Company of Fifers and Drummers Museum which is dedicated to the preservation of the fife and drum tradition. It houses one of the most unique collections of artifacts in the world, a visual and musical history of America on parade from the Revolutionary War to the present.

While the number of corps in the US waned over the years, fife and drum corps remained strong in Connecticut and especially in the lower CT River valley. Musters, where corps meet to showcase their skills and have fun, remain popular within the state. Deep River holds the oldest and largest muster in

the world with Westbrook right behind it.






In 1963 the Essex Fife and Drum Corps incorporated into the Sailing Masters of 1812. The Sailing Masters hold an event each May, the Commemoration of the Burning of the Ships. The Burning of the Ships Commemoration highlights the attack by the British in 1814 on Essex's privateering fleet and has a dozen fife and drum corps perform along with other groups. This year the Commemoration will be held on Saturday, May 11th. The parade starts at the Town Hall and makes its way to the CT River Museum where musical numbers from each corps and presentations from other groups are conducted.

The Sailing Masters of 1812 perform at annual and historical events in many states throughout New England, New York, across Connecticut and in all Essex parades. They have received accolades and awards from numerous events and government officials.

We are grateful to have this corps in our town, but the best part is that it is open to anyone 18 years or older to join. No experience is necessary as all training and uniforms are provided free to any interested person. Practices are held each Monday evening at 7:30 in the Town Hall. Stop by if you want to see what it's like and get more details. You do not need to be a resident to become a part of this fun and engaging tradition. 
Essex Veterans Memorial Hall Breaks Ground on Expansion and Renovation Project

Recognizes The Essex Foundation and Community for \$100,000 Grant Award, Others for In-kind Donations

n Friday, January 12 members of the Essex Veterans Memorial Hall (EVMH) held a groundbreaking ceremony for the expansion of and renovation of the building that serves as a resource for 180 members, their families, and the greater community. EVMH President Art Davies welcomed guests and thanked all who helped make the ambitious project possible. Special recognition was given to The Essex Foundation for its matching gift fundraising campaign that resulted in a \$100,000 grant award- \$50,000 from community donors matched by \$50,000 from the Foundation. Doane Engineering, Ring's End, and Architect Jerry Karpuska were also acknowledged for their generous in-kind donations of services and materials. House Committee Chair Paul Knudsen, who is overseeing the construction, provided an overview of the work which includes enlarging and renovating the kitchen; adding a new porch and outdoor dining area; installing a new roof and ADA accessible ramp; and updating the meeting room interior. Hall members will provide most of

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the volunteer labor while the \$100,000 award will be used to cover the cost of equipment, materials, and specialized labor.

The ceremony commenced with the presentation of the flag by EVMH Color Guard, followed by the national anthem, "The Star-Spangled Banner" performed by Community Music School Executive Director and retired Coast Guard Warrant Officer Richard Wyman on saxophone. An invocation and moment of silence was presented by Reverend David Stambaugh of Essex Congregational Church. Karen Baron then performed "America the Beautiful" on violin. Strickland Hyde of The Essex Foundation acknowledged and thanked the community for its tremendous outpouring of support that helped reach the \$100,000 mark in less than six months. After the closing remarks guests were invited to pick up a shovel for the ceremonial groundbreaking.

Essex Veterans Memorial Hall is the last known stand-alone, 501(c)(19) nonprofit veterans' organization on the East Coast. After World War II the Town of Essex conveyed the Centerbrook Schoolhouse to the group for \$1 with the stipulation that the organization remain intact and take full responsibility for maintaining the building. Located at 3 Westbrook Road, it is available for use free of charge to other nonprofit groups for meetings and activities. Non-



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Eversource Tree Trimming


Eversource has notified the Town that additional tree trimming will happen throughout 2024. The dark blue lines on the map (on page 42) are the roads that will be maintained by Lucas Tree who is obliged by the PURA (Public Utilities Regulatory Authority) regulations and state statutes to notify abutting owners of planned tree work on or over the Town roads. Tree owner approval is required for trees wholly on public property. According to these new statutes, residents have the right to accept the planned work, waive their rights to object to the work, modify the work or they can refuse all tree work if they choose. Residents wishing to modify the work or object to the trimming or removal should follow the procedure described in the brochures that will be given out by the contractor's permissions contact. Residents must also contact the Essex Tree Warden and Eversource in writing. The Tree Warden, Augie Pampel, can be reached via email at augiepampel@att.net or by phone at 860-388-7209. Eversource can be reached at the address and number in the informational brochure provided.


Work will also be done on the red line roads (see the map on next page).

To provide effective communication and better customer service, Eversource will seek property owner approval in advance of the tree work. Eversource will stop at all homes abutting areas of potential work to provide information and request approval for the trimming. It is incumbent upon the property owner to read the material carefully, ask questions, and/or contact the Eversource permissions contact listed on the informational brochure given to the property owners.

Trimming Specifications

SCHEDULED MAINTENANCE TRIM

All other roads or streets identified on the map in dark blue: Remove all branches within the clearance zone 8' to the side, 10' below, 15' overhead and hazards within reach of 70' bucket. Flat cut brush taller than telcom (16'). Trim 2' opening on open wire and secondary services. Flat cut brush and cut vines. Remove hazard trees less than or equal to 16" DBH within the clearance zone.

BACKBONE MAINTENANCE TRIM

Red lines (Route 153 and Route 602 "Main Street Centerbrook" and Old Deep River Road)

Re-clear overhead to previously established ETT clearances, including new growth into the clearance zone 10' to the side of the outer most conductor on backbones (8' to the side on laterals) and all limbs in the clearance zone under the primary.

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
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
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
