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First Selectman's Corner

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

Now that the warm weather has arrived it's nice to see so many people enjoying the civic campus, marinas, shops, restaurants, and attractions that make Essex a unique place to live, work and play. I'd like to welcome the new residents as well as the new restaurants and businesses in Town. I encourage everyone to take advantage of all there is to do in our three villages at this time of year.

ANNUAL BUDGET

First of all, I would like to thank the Essex residents for unanimously supporting the annual budget. The \$26,522,194 combined Town and Board of Education budget plan for fiscal year 2023-2024 was approved by voters at our Annual Town Budget Meeting held May 8th. The total spending package includes the Town government budget, an appropriation for Essex Elementary School, and the Town's share of the Region 4 education budget. I would like to give thanks to Finance Director Tracey Celentano, Selectmen Stacia Libby and Bruce Glowac, and the Board of Finance.

BE CONSIDERATE

I would also like to remind residents that the Town does not

have an ordinance on the hours of operation in which a contractor or landscaper may work at a property in our community. We would expect such hours to be 7:00 am - 5:00 pm on weekdays with more limited work on the weekends.

We rely on residents to be neighborly and considerate by ensuring that construction and the use of power tools

and landscaping equipment be used only during these times. We have avoided both noise and blight ordinances, but we do get complaints, so please be mindful of your neighbor's right to enjoy their property.

TOWN SIDEWALKS

Please remember to be diligent in making sure your trees, shrubs and bushes are not infringing on the Town sidewalks or roads. Overgrown plants may impact people's ability to use the roads or the sidewalks. This is a safety issue and sight line concern for pedestrians and traffic. There are numerous areas in Town where you can't walk on a sidewalk pushing

GRANT AWARDED

The Town of Essex was awarded a grant in the amount of \$595,611 for the construction of a critical pedestrian corridor connecting one of Essex's most densely populated neighborhoods (Heritage Cove) with North Main Street and the heart of Essex Village. The Town has been seeking funds for the construction of this sidewalk and pedestrian bridge for several years. A special thanks goes to the residents at Heritage Cove who have been lobbying for this sidewalk project since 2019.

HURRICANE SEASON HAS ARRIVED

Hurricane season is June 1st - November 30th each year, although storms can occur outside these dates. The Town of Essex has an Emergency Preparedness Guidebook and you may want to refer to these guidelines to help you plan.


SUMMER CONCERTS

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Scarecrow FestiFALL





Awards \$10,000 Grant to Support Children & Adolescents with Developmental Challenges



Members of The Essex Foundation Board of Directors tour The Mayer Center, Middlesex Health's new facility offering comprehensive services for children and adolescents with developmental challenges.

The Essex Foundation recently answered a call for support from Middlesex Health's The Mayer Center, a comprehensive service provider for children and adolescents with developmental challenges, such as autism, sensory processing disorder, speech disorders and cerebral palsy. The Foundation's \$10,000 grant helped

fund equipment for the sensory gym at the new 3,100 square-foot facility, located in a renovated space at 252 Westbrook Road in Essex, the former site of Middlesex Health's Shoreline Medical Center. According to Bruce Glowac, President of The Essex Foundation, "It was an easy decision by the Board to make the award and support

the vital services provided at The Mayer Center. We are happy to help ensure area children and their families have access to a state-of-the-art facility."

The Mayer Center is proud to offer applied behavioral analysis and treatment, speech and language pathology, physical therapy, and occupational therapy, all at one location. In addition to the sensory gym, the center has private treatment rooms and a group therapy space. The holistic treatment approach allows families to get the care that's needed with decreased travel and scheduling time.

The Essex Foundation, Inc. is a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization dedicated to making a difference in the lives of Essex residents by providing funding for needs not met by other organizations or sources. FISH (Friends in Service Here)

FISH was founded locally in 1970 to provide free rides to medical appointments for residents of Essex, Deep River, and Chester. The officers for 2023 are Henry May, President; Mary Samburg, Secretary; Barbara Ryan, Treasurer; Jack Frost, Driver Recruitment; and Bob Mountz, At Large. Dispatchers are John Heiser and Pat Callahan. The scheduler is Tony Carrano. Longtime driver and Vice President Stuart Warner retired in early 2023.

The volume of free rides given has increased from 35 to 45 per month to 60 to 70 per month, just less than pre-pandemic numbers of rides.

After not having FISH Annual Meetings in 2020 and 2021, FISH did have an Annual Meeting November 3, 2022.

The modest FISH budget is funded by grants from the Essex Community Fund, the Community Foundation of

Middlesex County, the Essex Rotary Club, the Essex Savings Bank, the Deep River Community Health Committee, the Town of Chester, the Town of Essex, and other organizations, as well as by contributions from our drivers, riders, and friends.




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World Cultures Programs are Back at Essex Elementary School

Grandparent Scam (aka Car Accident Scam)

Scams are not a new phenomenon in society. They have been around, seemingly, forever. As technology advances and the Internet continues to make anonymity easier, the basic scam is, well, not so "basic" anymore. For example, AI (artificial intelligence,) has been shown recently to take only a matter of seconds and a few words from an unsuspecting victim to clone their speech pattern and use it against them. There is guidance that suggests you should never answer an unknown caller with the word "yes" when they ask if they are "speaking to Mr. or Mrs. so-and-so." The voice sample can be recorded and used as consent to access your private records.

You have probably heard about "Grandparent Scams" or "Car Accident Scams" where criminals call a victim, typically someone who is older, and tell them their grandchild, child, or another relative was involved in a car accident. Criminals will typically portray themselves as a lawyer or bail bond agent. They then direct the victim to call another number to speak to the lawyer who is representing their family member. The criminals claim they need money for legal fees or to bail the person out of jail. The criminals

often include several reasons why the victim should not contact the police directly, suggesting that the victim is unable to verify the information with the proper authorities. Crim-



inals use the Internet to conduct some degree of research to identify older targets who have children, as well as the names of the children or grandchildren.

According to the Federal Trade Commission, the latest version of this scam uses AI technology to replicate the voice of a loved one, adding heightened reality and emotion to the call. How are they doing this, you might ask? Usually, the voices are cloned from an online Facebook or Instagram video post in which your family member speaks. The result is that the scam call is more believable to the victim. You know your family.

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If the situation sounds far-fetched, hang up and call your loved one directly at a number you know belongs to them. If you cannot get ahold of them, try another family member with whom they would have contact. Another prevention tip is to have a password to verify their identity. Decide ahead of time a nickname to use and ask the caller posing as your relative for the nickname. Make it something unbelievable to anyone else. For example, the best AI in the world will not know that grandma goes by "Quick Draw" to your granddaughter.

Criminals have also begun asking victims to pay them or send them money using cryptocurrency, gift cards, or money wires that are unlikely for the victim to ever get their money back, as they are permanent, untraceable, and not Federally regulated or insured. There have been several instances recently where criminals instruct victims to withdraw a large amount of cash from their bank, package it in an envelope, and hand it to a driver, who typically brings the package to another state. The drivers are usually innocent, unsuspecting Uber (or other rideshare service) workers who have no info on their client (the criminal.) It should be noted that scammers in these cases have specifically told victims not to speak with banking officials, who are trained to prevent their customers from becoming victims of known scams.

The best defense against these types of scams is building awareness for all and helping them to recognize and report these incidents faster and more frequently. Do not give unknown callers any information, especially privileged information (like passwords) or personally identifying information (like names, birthdays, social security numbers, phone numbers, emails, etc.). Additionally, most people can avoid being scammed by slowing down and verifying where they are sending money and by what means. Many of these scams depend on the criminals creating a sense of urgency so that the victim feels they do not have any time to validate what they are being told. By taking the time to make a few additional phone calls and conducting some research, victims should be able to identify these calls as scams.

If you or anyone you know has become a victim of one of these scams, especially if it involved the transferring of money, a report should be submitted to the FBI's Internet Crimes Complaint Center (IC3). If you or anyone you know has become a victim of identity theft a report should also be submitted to the Federal Trade Commissions (FTC) online reporting tool. The FTC also has a fraud reporting website at: https://reportfraud.ftc.gov/#/.

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The Probate Court and You

Do I Need Probate if All of the Estate Assets are Jointly Held?

When we are grieving the loss of a close family member, it can be challenging to concentrate, let alone fill out paperwork for the funeral home, life insurance company or the probate court.

To help be prepared for this challenge, it is important to know what the law is surrounding probate requirements, as well as the utility of following correct probate procedure, even if all estate assets are jointly held, in order to avoid negative downstream consequences.


FIRST

Connecticut law requires that the person in possession of the original will of a deceased person must deliver the will either to: (1) the person designated to be the executor, or (2) the Probate Court. If the will is delivered to the Probate Court, it should be delivered to the Probate Court where the deceased person last resided with an intent to stay (referred to as their domicile). If the person was domiciled in Chester, Clinton, Deep River, Essex, Haddam, Killingworth, Lyme, Old Saybrook or Westbrook, the will should be delivered to the Saybrook Probate Court located on the second floor of the Old Saybrook Town Hall at 302 Main Street in Old Saybrook. Sometimes people wonder what happens with these wills - it can be hard to let them go. We store these original wills in perpetuity, first in our office, then

in the Town Clerk's vault at the Old Saybrook Town Hall, and eventually at either the State Library (wills executed in 1976 or earlier) or at Meyer Records Management.

SECOND

Connecticut law also requires each person in actual or constructive possession of any property of the deceased person to file a Form CT 706 NT (a Connecticut Estate Tax Return for Nontaxable Estates) with the Probate Court. The Form CT 706 NT must be filed for each deceased person who, at the time of death was a Connecticut resident, within six (6) months after their date of death. When all assets are held jointly between spouses, filing the Form CT-706 NT may seem like an unwelcome, extra task at an already challenging time. If more time is needed, a request for an extension of time should be made with the Probate Court. The request will

be automatically granted as long as it is filed before the due date of the Form CT-706 NT (6 months after death). If spouses jointly own a home, it is very important that the Form CT-706 NT is filed, and lists the home. The reason why the home must be listed on the Form CT-706 NT even if it is owned jointly by spouses, is because a release of estate tax and probate fee liens from the Probate Court is needed in order to clear title to the home so it can later be sold. If the release is not obtained soon after the first spouse dies, it will still need to be obtained before the house can be sold, and can cause unwelcome

delay at the time of the real estate closing.

Fortunately, if all assets of the deceased person are owned jointly or pass by a beneficiary designation, an abbreviated process (called a "tax purposes only estate") allows probate to be completed quickly, often in several months' time.

RECYCLING

- Recycling is mandatory per CT Statute Sec. 22a-256 or Sec. 22a-208v.
- Items should be clean and only accepted items should go in compactor (see list of acceptable items on sign below compactor doors).

TRASH

- Household Trash Compactor is for Household Trash Only! Examples: Food waste, food wrappers, styrofoam packaging, kitchen & cooking waste, bathroom trash
- Pillows, bedding, carpet, plastic bins, construction materials, and electrical supplies do not belong in the household trash compactor! The Transfer Station Supervisor will tell you where to put these items.

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Community Rallies to Meet Essex Foundation Matching Gift Challenge to Support Local Veterans

\$100,000 Awarded for Expansion & Renovation of Essex Veterans Memorial Hall

Thanks to a tremendous outpouring of community support it took just six months to reach the \$100,000 goal to fund the Essex Veterans Memorial Hall's expansion and renovation project. In September, The Essex Foundation announced a matching gift challenge where every dollar up to \$50,000 donated by community members, groups, and businesses would be matched 100% by the Foundation to help Hall members in their efforts to welcome more community members and better serve their needs. Community contributions hit the \$50,000 mark in March, triggering the Foundation's \$50,000 match and a celebratory check presentation at the Centerbrook site on April 13.

veterans' organization on the East Coast. After World War II the Town of Essex conveyed the Centerbrook Schoolhouse to the group for \$1 with the stipulation that the organization remain intact and take full responsibility for maintaining the building. Located at 3 Westbrook Road in Centerbrook, it now serves as a resource for 180 members, their families, and the greater community.

Other nonprofit groups use the Hall free of charge for meetings and activities. Non-members can rent the space for special events and celebrations.

With recent renovations, parking lot improvements, and the installation

of a stand-by generator, also supported by grants from The Essex Foundation, the Hall can also be used as a community comfort station during storm-related power outages.




Garden Club members will continue to take care of watering

Inland Wetlands & Watercourses Commission

Caution: Wetlands at Work!

Beneath their natural beauty, wetland areas perform a number of vital environmental functions. In addition to their recreational uses, wetland areas help reduce flood damage by acting as water storage basins during storms and snow melts. Healthy wetlands help purify streams and rivers and recharge the water table.

PROTECTING WETLANDS AND WATERCOURSES

In 1972, the State of Connecticut enacted the Inland Wetlands and Watercourses Act to protect the fragile ecosystems of its inland wetland areas. The Act led to the establishment of the Essex Inland Wetlands and Watercourses Commission (EIW-WC) that is charged with helping to preserve the Town's inland wetlands areas.



The EIWWC helps balance the interests of property owners with protecting wetland ecosystems. The EIWWC regulated most proposed activities within wetland areas. While many people are aware that wetlands are legally protected, many do not realize that wetlands and watercourses are bordered by a designated 100-foot upland Review Area that is also legally protected from disturbance without a permit.

The EIWWC regulates activities such as tree or brush removal, filling, excavating and construction in wetlands and in the 100 foot- Upland Review Area. These activities can cause soil loss and erosion that can damage adjacent wetlands. Wetland areas are legally designated by a soil scientist or other professional.

Regulated activities require a permit application that is approved by the Commission. Non-regulated activities such as outdoor recreation, swimming, canoeing, camping and hiking are not regulated and do not require a permit, provided that they do not significantly disturb the natural character of the wetland or watercourse.

Before you begin a project or an activity in a wetland area or within 100 feet of a wetland, please call the Essex Land Use office 860-767-4340 x115 to learn how to apply for a permit.

Prepare for Power Outages this Summer

Eversource - Electricity Transmission & Distribution Company

Electricity to your property comes from Eversource not the Town of Essex. If you lose power, report the outage directly to Eversource - even if you think a neighbor already reported it. Eversource will calculate how many customers are without power in an area, assign a priority level and repair crew, and will provide customers with an estimated time for restoration.

Broken Pole / Downed Power Line

The Town of Essex cannot repair a broken pole or reconnect a downed power line - only Eversource crews can perform this work. Town crews will only clear branches and debris from roadways if there are no wires or other safety hazards. Eversource crews must first verify downed wires are de-energized before the Town crew can work safely

and clear roads. This takes time. Always be situationally aware of the dangers associated with downed wires and be prepared for prolonged outages. Know alternate routes to and from your home.

WORKING WITH THE NEXT GENERATION

- This spring, "Warriors in the Community" VRHS seniors, Noah and Sofia, helped clear part of a huge patch of Japanese Knotweed at Essex Elementary School. Fifteen trash bags full of this aggressive, invasive plant and roots were chopped and dug out. To limit the spread of knotweed, plants cannot go into the Town brush pile. They must be bagged. Watch for additional "Invasive species cleanup days" this summer if you would like to volunteer!
- VRHS senior, Madeline Rice, presented the findings of her Capstone project on the potential benefits of solar carports at VRHS, to the May 10th meeting of Sustainable Essex.
- We have embarked on an ambitious program to support composting efforts at ALL Region 4 schools. Partnering with Sustainable Chester and Deep River, we raised \$12,000 (matched by \$15,000 from Sustainable CT) to support:



- **1. Food scrap** collection and transport in all 5 Region 4 Schools for 2 years.
- **2. Bins and posters** at the schools to remind kids where food scraps should be disposed.
- A tri-town educational campaign to educate EVERY HOUSEHOLD about food scrap diversion and composting.



The Tree Committee is happy to accept donations for trees or plant memorial trees. The person's name for whom the tree was planted is engraved on a plaque in Town Hall. The ETC is pleased to acknowledge the generous donations from the Garden Club and Land Trust and to have been a partner with them in their visions of beautification and preservation for Essex over the years.

Every Arbor Day a ceremony is held at the Essex Elementary School and the Essex Land Trust and the Essex Tree Committee jointly plant a tree. This year was no exception. The event was educational and enjoyable for all.

A SUMMARY OF THE ESSEX TREE COMMITTEE'S MISSION & DUTIES.

The Essex Tree Committee was founded in 1990 to inventory, preserve and replace our beautiful street trees. The Tree Committee has 6 members appointed by the Selectmen, and the Chairman, Augie Pampel, Essex Tree Warden, as an ex-officio member. The members serve for terms of 3 years. The Tree Committee meets in March, April, May, and September.

Funding comes from the Town, grants and donations. The ETC must plant on town property, not private or state property. However, the committee and Tree Warden consult with homeowners and Eversource to attain the best outcome when trees are slated for removal.

The goal is to replace trees in town that are taken down while providing diverse trees with beautiful structure. Once a tree is planted, the vendor is responsible for its care for the first year. Then the Town takes over. During the fall and winter, the Tree Committee considers possible planting sites and varieties.

LET'S PLANT SOME TREES!

It is critical that we protect, preserve, and replace our wonderful Town trees that become diseased or stressed, as well as the trees on our own properties. Residents are welcome and encouraged to donate to the Tree Committee and can request a memorial tree be planted. Connecticut River Gateway Commission

FIFTY YEARS AGO, IN MAY 1973, Connecticut's legislature established the Connecticut River Gateway Commission to "prevent deterioration of the natural and traditional riverway scene for the enjoyment of present and future generations."

The river's unhealthy condition and the prospect of a national park stretching from Canada to Long Island Sound bringing a possible federal override of local control prompted political action. Senator Abe Ribicoff quoted an observer, "unless steps [are] taken to protect this resource [the Connecticut River] it could easily turn into a marine version of the Berlin Turnpike."

The legislation required five of the eight lower river towns — Chester, Deep River, East Haddam, Essex, Haddam, Lyme, Old Lyme and Old Saybrook — to join the compact for it to become official. All eight towns voted to join. In addition to the towns, representatives from a regional planning agency and a designee of the CT Department of Energy and Environmental Protection's Commissioner serve on the Gateway Commission today.

The Commission operates within a 21,500-acre Conservation Zone encompassing the river estuary and ridgelines that overlook the water. Its toolbox includes regulatory zoning standards, land protection and education. The Gateway Commission takes an even-handed approach in its responsibility, recognizing that the lower river valley's beauty makes the area desirable for development. A collaborative relationship with land use commissions, town planners and zoning enforcement officials helps the Commission strike a balance between preservation and development.

Since 1973, the Gateway has protected 1,100 acres of land in all eight River towns in partnership with towns, land trusts, private parties and the State.

Eversource Tree Trimming

Eversource has notified the Town that additional tree trimming will begin in the

second and third quarters of 2023. Second quarter work will begin on Lynn Rd and the contractor will be Asplundh. The dark blue lines on the map are the roads that will be maintained by the contractor Lucas. Both contractors are obliged by the PURA (Public Utilities Regulatory Authority) regulations and state statutes to notify abutting owners of planned tree work on or over the Town roads. Tree owner approval is required for trees wholly on public property. According to these new statutes, residents have the right to accept the planned work, waive their rights to object to the work, modify the work or they can refuse all tree work if they choose. Residents wishing to modify the work or object to the trimming or removal should follow the procedure described in the brochures that will be given out by the contractor's permissions contact. Residents must also contact the Essex Tree Warden and Eversource in writing. The Tree Warden, Augie Pampel, can be reached at: augiepampel@att.net or 860-388-7209. Eversource can be reached at the address and number in the informational brochure provided.

Work will also be done on the red line roads.

To provide effective communication and better customer service, Eversource will seek property owner approval in advance of the tree work. Eversource will stop at all homes abutting areas of potential work to provide information and request approval for the trimming. It is incumbent upon the property owner to read the material carefully, ask questions, and / or contact the Eversource permissions contact listed on the brochures given to the property owners.

Trimming Specifications CUSTOMER FOCUSED ETT (CF ETT)

Lynn Road ONLY:


Remove all branches and tall growing trees within the 10' clearance zone. Prune and remove all limbs within the clearance zone over the primary within 10' to the side of the outermost primary and all limbs within the clearance zone under the primary. Trim 2' open wire services and secondaries. Flat cut brush and cut vines.

STANDARD MAINTENANCE TRIM (SMT)

All other roads or streets identified on the map in dark blue:

Remove all branches within the clearance zone 8' to the side, 10' below, 15' overhead and hazards within reach of 70' bucket. Flat

cut brush taller than telcom (16'). Trim 2' opening on open wire and secondary services. Flat cut brush and cut vines. Remove hazard trees less than or equal to 16" DBH within the clearance zone.



MAINTENANCE ETT (METT)

Red lines (Route 154)

Re-clear overhead to previously established ETT clearances, including new growth into the clearance zone 10' to the side of the outer most conductor on backbones (8' to the side on laterals) and all limbs in the clearance zone under the primary.
