

# **Essex Elementary School Foundation Summer Math Passport Program**

### EES STUDENTS FIND MATH IN THEIR COMMUNITY

A new Summer Math Passport Program was established at Essex Elementary School (EES) this year. Created by EES math coach, Shannon Vandermale, the program invited all students to participate, from incoming kindergarteners to outgoing 6th-graders. Similar to the summer reading program at EES, the math passports were designed to help inspire and engage students in unique ways to have fun while continuing to learn math throughout the summer.

Students received their passports the last week of May which contained math equations at various grade-levels related to businesses, non-profits, buildings, and historical sites located throughout the Town of Essex. Examples of equations included counting the number of trails at an Essex Land Trust location and then calculating the time it would take to complete all of the trails at 3 miles per hour, or visiting Scoops Ice Cream to calculate the cost difference between a small and large cone or looking for and documenting geometric shapes found at the town

park. The program and equations were also formatted so that students who were away on summer vacations could easily adapt and apply equations to alternative locations. Completed passports were turned in upon the return to school in September.

Essex Elementary School Foundation (EESF) proudly supported the Summer Math Passport Program by funding the printing costs of the passports along with prizes for the participants. Participants who completed at least six activities received a deck of playing cards, and every student who turned in their passport was entered into a grade-level raffle to receive a gift certificate to Toys Ahoy in Essex, CT, also donated by EESF.

"We were thrilled to see the number of students who participated in this inaugural program," says Bill Jacaruso, President of the Essex Elementary School Foundation. "115 students submitted their completed passports, and we are confident that even more will do so next year. The foundation looks to continue to support programs like this to help students continue to develop their math skills all year long." FISH was founded locally in 1970 to provide free rides to medical appointments for residents of Essex, Deep River and Chester. The officers for 2021 are Henry May, President; Stuart Warner, Vice president; Mary Samburg, Secretary; Barbara Ryan, Treasurer and Jack Frost, Driver Recruitment. Dispatchers are John Heiser and Tony Carrano.

With the onset of COVID-19, the FISH

Board decided to suspend driving March 17, 2020. FISH provided some rides over the last several months in 2021 and have resumed full service beginning this September 2021. We have coordinated our plans with the health departments of Essex, Deep River and Chester. FISH drivers and riders are required to be vaccinated and to wear masks.

The modest FISH budget has been funded

in the past by grants from the Essex Community Fund, the Community Foundation of Middlesex County, the Essex Rotary Club, the Essex Savings Bank, the Deep River Community Health Committee, the Town of Chester, the Town of Essex, and other organizations, as well as by contributions from our drivers, riders and friends. We did not ask for donations for 2021.

# Sister Cities - Essex & Haiti

### UNDERSTANDING HAITI

In September, the Southeastern Connecticut World Affairs Council (SECWAC) and Sister Cities Essex Haiti (SCEH) welcomed Professor and Author Laurent Dubois for a lecture on how the history of Haiti has had a powerful impact on the complex political and cultural dynamics of the country.

As SECWAC Executive Director Paul Nugent wrote: "Your insights on the history of Haiti illuminated for us the sources of the problems in that beleaguered country, but also what we can learn from the people of Haiti - a perfect example of how to understand the present by examining the past." Dubois's book "Haiti: The Aftershocks of History" should be required reading for anyone who simply dismisses Haiti as "cursed" and "hopeless," not realizing what an incredible country it is despite its challenges.

Many in our community do not know that Haiti was once the wealthiest country in the Caribbean sharing the island of Hispaniola with the Dominican Republic. However, the source of its wealth was based on a brutal system of plantation slavery. Haiti was the first country in the Western Hemisphere to experience a successful slave revolt in 1804, but it came at a tremendous price for Haitians. Not only did

its citizens have to pay tremendous reparations to France but the intervention and policies of the United States also handicapped any attempts at an easy road to Democracy, and in fact, have continued to add to Haiti's challenges.

Deschapelles, is a special place. Hospital Albert Schweitzer provides health services and employs 400 people boosting the economy. The Crosby Fund for Haitian Education provides scholarships to able needy children, and Sister Cities Essex Haiti supports beneficial programs that are requested by



community including exemplary library, tennis, music, and robotics programs. All programs are run by local Haitians. Programs like these in towns like this, where people are in charge of their own destiny, can serve as a model that empowers the Haitians to create a stronger country. Essex Library hosts its annual meeting on October 27 at 5:00 pm with special guest Julian Zelizer, frequent commentator on political history and contemporary politics on CNN and other national and international media. He will discuss the topic "Is Congress Broken?" with moderator Sam Tanenhaus, former Editor of The New York Time Book Review. Zelizer is the Malcom

Stevenson Forbes, Class of 1941 Professor of History and Public Affairs at Princeton University and the author of several books; his newest biography, *Abraham Joshua Heschel: A Life of Radical Amazement*, will be published in October, 2021 by Yale University Press. Zelizer's other books include: *Burning Down the House: Newt Gingrich, the Fall of a Speaker and the Rise of the New Republican Party*; and *On Capitol Hill: The Struggle to Reform Congress and its Consequences, 1948-2000.* Dr. Zelizer is a graduate of Brandeis University and earned his doctorate at The Johns Hopkins University.

Essex Library was the recipient of a generous grant from Guilford Savings Bank and the Community Foundation of Middlesex County which funded the purchase of six new Chromebooks and a series of tech workshops this fall for the community called the 2021 Laptop Series. Series topics include: how to use Chromebooks; coding; using free online genealogy resources; cutting the cord; and downloading digital resources from the library. # All About Brandy After Dinner

Brandy, short for Brandywine comes in a variety of types or flavors. Most brandies are made from grapes, but what keeps them apart from wine is that

they are distilled. Distilling is vaporizing liquid by heating it until it reaches 212 degrees fahrenheit which decreases the water content, producing higher alcohol content, then catching the vapors and cooling them so they form back into liquid. The alcohol content of brandy is usually at 40% or 80 proof. The premiere brandies from France are produced in the town of Cognac. This brandy is distilled double in pot stills to give its unique flavors. Most are then aged in wooden casks. Cognac is blended so typically there is no set age, however there are categories of quality. The first one being V.S. which means very special, contains brandy no less than 3 years old. V.S.O.P stands for very old special pale ale no less than 5 years old. The XO which is the superior brandy of Cognac and the oldest age blended but can vary quite a bit between brandy houses.

Armagnac is a town in the region of Gascon which is another area in France producing fine quality brandy. This style is also said to be better than a lot of Cognacs but doesn't quite get the recognition. This brandy has great depth and a touch of sweetness. Each of these brandies from France has different grape profiles according to where it comes from. While we are still in France let us discuss the region of Calvados. The brandy from here is made from apples instead of grapes, which produce a slight apple taste, more the essence of the fruit rather than the bright flavor and tartness. All the brandies above are considered brown because they get their color from the oak barrels. The clear brandy is called Eaux De Vie. They could be considered the essence of the fruit that it's produced from. Some examples are Kirsch which is cherry brandy, Framboise - raspberry brandy and Piore - pear brandy. These brandies are not sweet but they do have intense flavors and smell. We also have these styles of brandy made here in Connecticut.

California also produces some excellent quality brandies, but the bulk are more affordable because they are slightly less quality and mass produced. Many recipes call for Cognac which is the most expensive way to go, where most any brand will do. Also instead of using Calvados for apple brandy you can substitute it for Apple Jack a less expensive version produced in California.

I hope this widens your temptation to try a brandy as an after dinner cocktail.

# Out of sight, out of mind?



Not if you're dumping leaves or other yard waste into a stream, pond, or other wetlands!


Although it may seem like a natural way to dispose of grass and leaves, the extra burden of organic material can harm a wetland. Excess organics and nutrients can overload

waterways as well as suffocate plant and animal life living there. Additionally, it's against State and Town regulations to dump in wetlands.

Many ponds experience natural filling over the course of decades and centuries called "eutrophication", turning deep ponds to shallow and shallower ponds, then to bogs, and ultimately meadows. Dumping lawn waste into ponds or the streams that feed them can accelerate the process significantly.

If you've been in Essex long enough, you've seen waterbodies change over time, experiencing algae blooms and/ or growing vegetation in areas that were once too deep for it to establish. Additionally, when leaves are placed in seasonal wetlands like vernal pools, the wildlife that depend on them can no longer breed or feed there. Wetlands don't have to have year-round visible water to be wetlands.

So, what should you do with the lawn waste generated from maintaining your yard? Composting away from wetlands is a great option, if you have a little space. A simple online search on "Composting" will offer guidance. The resulting compost is great for a top-dressing for next year's lawn or for use in your garden. Follow guidance for







material mix and pH management - it's not complicated. You can add vegetable scraps from your kitchen, too.



# SCSU Baseball Coach Tim Shea - From a baseball dream to a baseball dream job... by Sigrid Kun

Like for so many kids, Tim Shea had the dream - the lure of being a major league baseball player. While the West Haven Little Leaguer didn't get to the MLB, he's found his baseball


home as head baseball coach at Southern Connecticut State University.

### SOME THINGS ARE JUST MEANT TO BE....

Coach Shea and SCSU simply go together. But SCSU was never in the plans. Shea was recruited by UCONN as a student athlete – following in his big brother's footsteps. It was the Big East, with annual College World Series opportunities. The perfect fit.

"I left before the first workout," recounts Shea. Home sick and feeling lost on a large campus, Shea was thinking UNH. Then, Shea experienced one of the most influential conversations of his life. Two simple questions from Joe Tonelli, Shea's former athletic director at Notre Dame HS and assistant coach at UNH. 'Why do you want to go to UNH?' Shea's simple answer – great baseball program.

'What do you want to study and what profession do you want after playing?' After some thought Shea's reply was possibly a teacher and a coach. Shea recalls an unforgettable response. "Then why the hell do you want to go to UNH? Right up the road is Southern. They have exactly what you are looking for!"



Shea blossomed as a SCSU student athlete. The two-year captain led the nation in doubles per game in 1987, his senior year. He was team MVP in 1985 and Second-Team All-Conference in 1986. He secured a degree in Special Education, a teaching job and coached football and baseball at NDHS before arriving back at SCSU in 1991 as an assistant and becoming head coach in 2001. Over his 32year tenure coaching the Owls, there are six NCAA Tournament appearances and two NCAA World Series berths. Shea is a three-time Northeast 10 Conference Coach of the Year and a three-time Northeast Regional Coach of the Year. He's had 8 seasons of 30 or more wins. On May 1, 2019 he captured his 467th victory to become the winningest coach in program history.

### **KEYS TO SUCCESS**

While there are so many analytics (spin ratios, launch angles), Shea trusts his eyes when determining whether a player has what it takes or not. Along with skill set, Shea looks for intangibles like being willing to sacrifice, accountability, dedication, determination and mental toughness. From there, he gets to know his players and what makes them tick. "The more you know a player, the better suited you are to motivate them and help them reach their full potential," he explains. Having effective practices requires strong time management skills. Structure and discipline are necessary so that players respond as expected in tough situations.

The players hold a special place in Shea's heart, not just accomplishments on the field but also in their professional and family lives. Many are married, have children. They are police officer, firemen, teachers, coaches, businessmen, and even a Navy Seal. "I'm so proud of each and every one of them," Shea underscores.



### THE LOVE OF BASEBALL / FAMILY

Shea's love of baseball derives from his family. His mother and father encouraged him to play sports. "My Dad was not only the absolute best father one could ask for, he was also the best coach," reflects Shea. Shea tagged along with his brother to play in sand lot games. Playing baseball with the older kids showed Shea that he could compete.

Family is still central to Shea – from walking the dog with his wife, golfing with his son, playing dominoes with his wife, mother, mother and father-in-law ... or, his favorite, playing with his two grand-daughters. And there's that memorable moment in his coaching career. "Slapping my son TJ's hands as he rounded third base after hitting a game tying 3-run homerun at the College World Series," he relates. "And then, later that evening, sharing the stage with him at the post-game conference and hear him deflect all the praise for his performance to the play and comradery of his teammates. I was not just a proud coach but also a proud father. It doesn't get any better than that!"

#### WHAT KEEPS HIM GOING?

There are two things. "One is my players," Shea says. "I just love that I am able to be a small part of their lives. Helping them to reach their full potential on and off the field. The second thing that keeps me going is the chase. I tell my players every day: 'Chase perfection to catch excellence.' I love the chase, the process, the journey. Trying to get better every day so that at the end of a season something magical might happen."
